Taiwan Ablaze!

On Monday, November 29, the China Evangelical Lutheran Church (CELC) elected a new Executive Committee at its annual General Conference. Rev. Andrew Miao was elected president. Other Executive Committee members include Rev. Jen-Jhu Ho, Rev. Bo-jiang Zhu, Rev. Alexander Wu, Rev. John Wan, Rev. Aaron Chu, Rev. Luther Jen, Rev. Stephen Wang, and Mr. Ji-liang Dong.

President Miao has been the pastor of Eternal Life Lutheran church in Taipei, Taiwan for the past 18 years. Besides his ministry as pastor of a thriving congregation, supervising and providing pastors for area churches, his mission heart has led him to plant churches in the Taipei area, visit China for theological training, and spearhead an

effort for the entire Eternal Life congregation to be involved in church planting in the Northern Shan State of Myanmar. Eternal Life Church, together with support from Truth Lutheran Church, also in Taipei, has established a preaching station with word and sacrament ministry as well as human care outreach to the Chinese-speaking people in Northern Burma. They

have sent a team of members each summer for the past three years to work with the local people and to reach out to them with God's love.

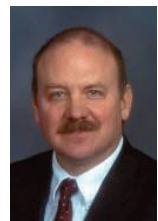
Keep President Miao and the rest of the new leaders of the CELC in prayer as they forge forward in the Great Commission to spread the Gospel in the Chinese world!

PLI Hong Kong

October 31 through November 3, the Lutheran Church Hong Kong Synod (LCHKS) and Pastoral Leadership Institute (PLI) International jointly conducted a historic training for PLI Hong Kong. Five church workers from the LC-HKS completed the 4th year of PLI training in the second class of PLI Hong Kong alongside 9 missionaries from LCMS World Mission. In addition, 18 new church workers from several LC-HKS churches started year one of the PLI training. This new class of PLI Hong Kong marks the first time that the PLI International curriculum will be taught entirely by local trainers who are previous graduates of PLI International. PLI Hong Kong training equips LC-HKS church workers with leadership skills for service to the church. It also serves to deepen the relationships between church workers from different congregations and to affirm the core mission of the church to connect people to Jesus.

New HKIS Head of School

HKIS recently shared on their website, "Kevin M. Dunning has been selected as HKIS' new head of school, effective July 2011. Kevin has the experience, qualifications and commitment to lead HKIS to our next level of excellence by advancing our mission and championing our Student Learning Results.

"Kevin Dunning serves as the executive director of Faith Lutheran Jr./Sr. High School in Las Vegas, Nevada. Under

his leadership, Faith has grown from a school of 475 students to the largest private school in Nevada and the largest Lutheran school in the United States, now with more than 1,300 students. He is a frequent presenter at Lutheran conferences and the author of several published essays and devotional materials.

"During his tenure at Faith, he oversaw the development of a 40-acre campus, with facilities totaling more than 160,000 square feet. In 2009, the school launched a 1:1 Apple program at the high school level, complementing an already technologically rich school campus. Demonstrating his financial acumen, in 2000, Kevin led the school in becoming the first Nevada non-public school to qualify for tax-exempt bond financing, which funded the school's significant physical growth.

"Kevin and his wife of 31 years, Mary, who is also a teacher at Faith, have two adult children, Jeremy and Maggie.

LCMS World Mission gives thanks to God for His gracious provision of such a strong candidate to lead HKIS as it continues to grow in its 21st century ministry to

The purpose of the seminars was to discuss the theory and practice of Christian Education. The LCHKS Christian Education Committee sponsored the seminars to emphasize the connection between Lutheran schools and Lutheran congregations and the joint mission both share in connecting people to Christ.

Lutheran Rainbow Center Opens

Hong Kong Lutheran Social Services celebrated the opening of its Lutheran Rainbow Center, a counseling center for substance abusers in Hong Kong. In recent years, a sharp increase in substance abuse rates among teens and young people had caused great con-

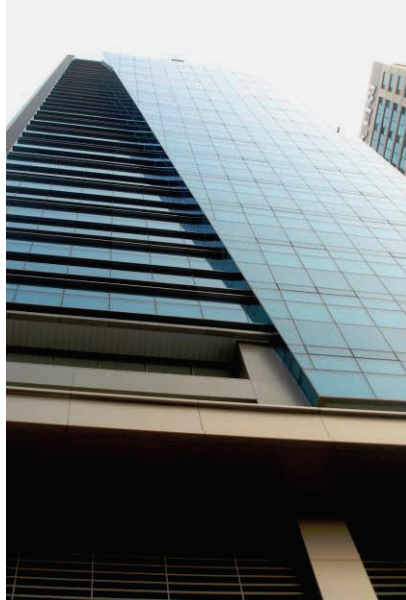

Luther Tower Dedicated at 40th LCK Assembly

From October 10 to 12, the LCK's 40th Annual General Assembly took place at Luther Tower and Daejo-dong Lutheran Church in Seoul. The opening worship service was held at the newly constructed Luther Tower in Jamsil in Seoul, attended by about 500 church members and guests. It was a very special event, as the opening worship was also the Dedication Service for the new Luther Tower Building which received official permission to open in July 2010. The event also included the inauguration of a Luther statue and an Easter cross, both standing at the main entrance of Luther Tower. The Luther statue shows Luther working on his Bible translation. Honorary guests included Rev. Maynard W. Dorow (pioneer LCMS missionary), Rev. Dr. Albert Colver (LCMS Dir. of Church Relations & Assistant to the President), Rev. John Mehl (LCMS WM Asia Regional Director), Rev. Carl Hanson (LCMS WM Facilitator for East Asia), Rev. Yutaka Kumei (Japan Lutheran Church President), Rev. Mamoru Saito (Japan Lutheran Theological Seminary Associate Prof.), Deaconess Yang Hime (Omiya Zion Lutheran Church in Japan), Rev. Malte Rhinow (Evangelical Lutheran Church in Bavaria, Germany), Mr. Matt Wasmund (newly appointed LCMS WM missionary in Korea), and Rev. Byeong-Ho Jeon (National Council of Churches in Korea President).

New Congregations

The Lutheran Church in Korea (LCK) has founded two new local churches. On September 12, "New Way Lutheran Church" was dedicated in Yongin City, Gyeonggi Province. Along with the Dedication Service, the instal-

lation of Rev. Jang-Heon Kim was also celebrated. Rev. Kim graduated from the Graduate School of Theology at Luther University (LTU). He is presently writing his doctoral thesis, after completing his Th.D. course work in Christian Education at the Anglican Theological Seminary. While being assigned to Wangshimni Church in Seoul as Pastor for Education, he received his call for developing a new local church.

On October 3, "New Heaven Lutheran Church" was dedicated in Osan City, Gyeonggi Province. During the Dedication Service, pastor-in-training Rev. Jeong-Ho Choi was ordained and installed. After completing his education as pastor-in-training at Daejo-dong Lutheran Church in Seoul, Rev. Choi received his call to develop a new congregation. He received his M.Div from the Graduate School of Theology of Luther University and is enrolled in a Th.M. course in Pastoral Counseling at Soongshil University in Seoul. He intends to focus his ministry on counseling. With the foundation of these two new local churches, LCK now has a total of 47

congregations, with plans to start four new congregations in 2011.

LTU President Rev. Kim's 40th Ordination Anniversary

On October 5, some 250 participants celebrated the 40th anniversary of Luther University (LTU) President Rev. Hae-Chul Kim's Ordination at the main auditorium of Luther University. Rev. Kim is now 76 years old, and formerly served as pastor of Central Lutheran Church in Seoul, and Palbok Church, located at the LTU campus in Yongin City, Gyeonggi Province. He also served as the second LCK

Church President and as a Professor at LTU. After his retirement, he was installed as LTU President in February 2010. The Lutheran Church in Korea organized the Celebration Worship to honor President Kim's lifelong ministry.

New LCMS Missionary

On October 11, on the second day of the 40th General Assembly meeting at Daejo-dong Lutheran Church in Seoul, newly appointed LCMS World Mission missionary Mr. Matt Wasmund was installed. The installation was attended by Lutheran Church in Korea (LCK) President Hyun-Sub Um and LCMS World Mission Asia Regional Director Rev. John Mehl. After his installation, Mr. Matt Wasmund gave a presentation about LCMS WM English education outreach in Taiwan and Japan and explained future mission plans. Mr. Matt Wasmund is responsible for the arrangement and set up of missionaries teaching English in the East Asian region. In South Korea, he also acts as a liai-

son between the LCK and LCMS World Mission.

493rd Reformation Anniversary

On October 31, around 450 members of the Lutheran Church in Korea (LCK) participated in a Reformation Anniversary Worship Service held at Luther University (LTU). The offering was dedicated to the "1004 Angels for LTU" Project, and the service was aired nationally twice in November on CBS TV. It later was recorded on CD, and is now used as mission material by Lutheran congregations. The Reformation Anniversary Service is held every year in October as a joint worship service of the LCK.

Korean Luther Society Lecture & Assembly

Korean Luther Society President, Dr. Jin-Seob Eom (Professor of Church History at Luther University), hosted the Society's annual Luther Lecture at Central Lutheran Church in Seoul on October 28. The public lecture was led by Prof. Dr. Johannes Schilling, President of the German Luther Society. The theme was "Martin Luther - Life and Letters." Dr. Moon-Kee Ki (Prof. of Church History at Pyungtaek University) and Dr. Deok-Hyeong Hwang (Prof. for Systematic Theology at Seoul Theological University) offered responses. After the lecture, the Korean Luther Society held its Annual Assembly where Dr. Eom was reappointed President. Prof. Schilling, who is involved in preparations for the 500th Reformation Anniversary in Germany, promised to work closely with the Korean Luther Society to ensure Korean protestant churches are actively involved in the celebrations. Prof. Schilling also held several well-received lectures for LCK pastors and students of

Japan Ablaze!

Celebrating VYM Japan

Rev. John Mehl, LCMS World Mission's Regional Director for Asia, and Rev. Shinri Emoto, Missions Secretary of the Japan Lutheran Church (JLC), share the following joint announcement:

"Volunteer Youth Ministry Japan (VYM) began as an outgrowth of a forerunner program known as Prince of Peace Volunteers (POPV). Approximately 80 LCMS lay missionaries had served with POPV in Japan since its inception in 1965 until 1973, when the program officially transitioned to VYM. Since then, over 220 lay missionaries have been sent by the LCMS Board for Mission Services to work closely with the JLC as relationship-builders and English teachers, sharing the love of Christ in word and deed.

"After almost 50 years of cooperation between the LCMS and the JLC, it is regretfully announced that the VYM program will close at the end of March 2011 due to recruitment and fundraising challenges. The JLC, in its most

recent publication (*Kyokai Dayori*) shared the news while simultaneously 'giving heartfelt thanks for the missionaries who have labored on behalf of God's mission in Japan.'"

"February 26, 2011 has been tentatively selected as the date for a closing worship service and reception to be held at the Tokyo Lutheran Center Church in Iidabashi. Even though this program is closing, new possibilities for continuing joint ministry are being discussed, including long- and short-term mission opportunities.'

In its history, the VYM program branched out to Taiwan (1978 to 2004) and Hong Kong (1980-83).

The Prince of Peace Volunteer (POPV) program was a youth team ministry both in North America where it sent teams to work in inner-city areas, as well as overseas locations, including Japan, India, Lebanon, Nigeria, the Philippines and Venezuela. It was sponsored by the Board for Young People's Work of the LCMS.

The Japan POPV program was a regional branch of the American POPV. The LCMS Board for Mission would receive requests from the JLC and then ask the POPV to recruit and screen applicants, with the Board and POPV approving the recruits.

Additionally, an exchange component included more than 10 Japanese youth serving in the United States and others in Singapore and the Philippines. For example, in 1968, three Japanese youth went to Oakland, Calif., in the East-to-West POPV program. Mrs. Toshiko Taguchi worked at Bethlehem Lutheran Church and Community Center in downtown Oakland and helped at the Head Start program for children there. Mr. Masahiro Ando, another Oakland volunteer, later became a pastor with the JLC.

Give thanks to God for the nearly 300 missionary servants that responded to God's call to serve the people of Japan through POPV and VYM alongside the JLC. Rejoice in how the Spirit has touched the lives of many

Japanese people through this joint program since 1965.

A visiting team of volunteers from St. Peter's Lutheran Church in Columbus, Indiana came to serve in Indonesia for one week. The five-member team included Darin Wetschurack, Scott Krueger, Lisa Likens, Jim Harter, and Daniel Craig. The original focus for the team was to conduct two eyeglass clinics. However, as the planning and scheduling evolved, it turned out there were many other roles for the team members, as they also visited an orphanage and served the students and teachers of Sekolah Pelita Harapan

(School of Light & Hope) in the city of Lippo Cikarang.

Due to complications which occurred when ALL of the team members' bags were lost in transit, it looked like they might have to cancel the first scheduled eyeglass clinic because they did not have any glasses. However, all ten pieces of the team's luggage miraculously cleared customs and arrived just 30 minutes before the start of the first clinic in Lippo Cikarang. Despite these unexpected difficulties, the clinic was a re-

in Bandung, and people began lining up in the early morning for the clinic which was scheduled to start at 3:00 p.m. More than 150 people were served at the second clinic.

Philippines Ablaze!

2nd Annual LCP National Pastoral Conference

On December 6-10, 31 pastors from The Lutheran Church in the Philippines (LCP) and four LCMS World Mission missionaries met in Linamon, Mindanao for the second annual LCP National Pastoral Conference. The theme was "How to Live the Christian Life: from a Lutheran and Scriptural Perspective."

Guest presenters included the Rev. John Mehl and Rev. Carl Hanson. During the sessions, Rev. Mehl covered the topics "Understanding the Mission of the Church" and "How to be an active member in the mission," while Rev. Hanson led a discussion on the topic of "A Mission Life of Christian Service to my Neighbor." LCP pastors engaged in conversations and discussions to help create an intentional and realistic plan to best serve both people in the community and within the congregation. Other highlights of the conference included daily and nightly devotions and worship services and times for fellowship.

LCP Continues to Strive Toward Ablaze! Goals

In 2005, the LCP made an Ablaze! goal to plant 100 new congregations by 2017. District and congregational leadership have worked to develop outreach programs for all members of the LCP. It is estimated that pastors and members have reached out with the Gospel to 110,000 individuals in 2010 alone. The average member brings more than 5 guests to church each year in two of the districts. Since setting the goal of 100 congregations five years ago, the LCP has started six new congregations and established 40 mission sta-

tions. The mission stations are church plants and it is the prayer of the church that these will all grow into strong and healthy congregations. The Holy Spirit is working powerfully through the LCP.

The Christmas celebration included seminarians and the seminary faculty, staff and their families. Following the worship, everyone joined in fellowship to enjoy many Filipino culinary treats including goat curry, lechon, lumpia and barbeque. LCP President Rev. James Cerdeñola and his wife Evelyn helped with cooking the meal. The evening was capped with a bonfire where people

gathered for singing and storytelling.

CUI Professor Encourages Missionaries in Asia

On sabbatical leave from Concordia University Irvine, Dr. Christine Ross visited Lutheran mission sites and collaborated with Lutheran Education work across Asia. Dr. Ross visited and supported missionaries and local educators in Taiwan, Macau, Hong Kong, and other countries in the region.

In Taiwan, Dr. Ross was able to visit Concordia Middle School where she observed classes and helped the 11 LCMS missionaries who are teaching Bible classes. She was also able to attend several fellowship and Bible study activities, providing support and encouragement for missionaries in Taiwan. In Macau and Hong Kong, Professor Ross observed English and Bible classes led by LCMS missionaries and also connected with pastors and Educators in the Lutheran Church-Hong Kong Synod. One valuable contribution Dr. Ross brought to the LCMS missionaries was instruction on teaching skills that provided reminders about basics of lesson planning, Bible teaching, and tools for emphasizing the gospel in teaching.

A common story Dr. Ross heard from local Christians in all the locations she visited was that they were first reached with the gospel through a foreign Christian teaching English. "For me, an amazing part of the trip was to experience how English can

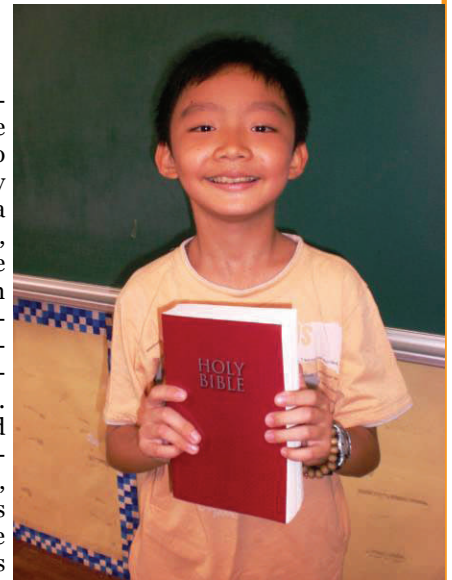
be a medium for gospel outreach," said Dr. Ross at the conclusion of her visit. LCMS World Mission missionaries who are teaching English in Asia are serving a real human need by teaching English and Bible, but in word and deed they are living their Christian faith. In the relationships that are established through English classes, the missionaries are able to confess the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and the Holy Spirit uses them to bring people to the church.

Dr. Ross returns to Concordia University Irvine where she continues as Director of the DCE program and next semester will teach a class on Mission Theology and Practice. Pray for additional opportunities for collaboration between Concor-

dia University Irvine and missions work in Asia.

Joint Visit to Local School

Five LCMS missionaries and two Taiwanese colleagues were able to travel to a local county school to perform a drama, sing songs, and lead the entire school of more than 80 students in activities in which the Gospel was shared in simple and clear ways. This marks the second visit of LCMS missionaries to this school, where the students mainly come from the rural surroundings and have few opportunities to hear the message of Jesus.

Macau Ablaze!

Scholarship trip

LCMS missionaries from Macau and Hong Kong, members from St. Paul Lutheran Church in Macau, and several friends from Guangdong province in Southern China teamed up with the Concordia Welfare and Education Foundation (CWEF) to

provide underprivileged students with grants to assist them in attending school. In early October, over 20 people joined a service team to travel to a rural area in western Guangdong province to deliver the grants and connect with the recipients. Rural families often lack the resources to keep children in school, and so it is com-

mon to see children discontinue their formal education at a young age. Grants provided through a partnership between CWEF and the Concordia English Center in Macau enable families to keep the students in school. The team members visited several different locations.

They taught adults and children English using songs and stories and also visited grant recipients in their homes and provided extra school supplies. Through these service trips which take place twice a year, team members have been able to establish long-term relationships with grant recipients.

Concordia's School Office Opens in Hanoi

December 1 marked a day of smiles and cardboard boxes as the Concordia International School Hanoi (CISH) administrative team moved into their new Hanoi office. The office is located on the 4th floor of the CMC building, sitting directly above three full floors which are currently under renovation and will be the new CISH campus when completed. Architects spent time on the site last week to go over the details of the individual classrooms and estimate the renovations should be done by late April, in plenty of time for the start of classes in mid-August 2011.

Once the building renovations are complete, classroom furniture, books, and all other educational materials will fill the soon-to-be learning space of the new preschool to grade 7 classrooms. Along with the teacher resource library, each grade level will have their own classroom library fitted with materials to suit their reading level. The new campus will also boast its own student/teacher cafeteria, science lab, an outdoor playground, and an auditorium that can be used for school perform-

New Volunteers Arrive in Vietnam

Jerry and Karen Markin, the latest volunteers to serve in Vietnam, have arrived! Based in Lancaster, CA, Jerry and Karen have years of international education experience, most recently spending 12 years teaching at Hong Kong International School. After a week of orientation in Hanoi, Jerry and Karen loaded up their things on November 9 and made the three-hour trip to Phu Tho town in Phu Tho province where they will serve as English teachers at Hung Vuong University (HVU). Since 1998 LCMS World Mission has been placing volunteers at HVU, a prominent university in northern Vietnam. All of the 4,000 students who live and study at HVU come from rural areas in Phu Tho and other northern provinces. Karen and Jerry will have the opportunity to know about 300 of these students personally through their classes and other outreach activities.

Papua New Guinea Ablaze!

Lutheran University of Papua New Guinea

On November 15, 2006, the National Parliament of Papua New Guinea authorized the establishment of Lutheran University of Papua New Guinea which was to be sponsored by the Morobe Provincial Government, the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Papua New Guinea (ELCPNG), and the Gutnius Lutheran Church of Papua New Guinea (GLCPNG).

Since then, the University has been taking important steps on the path to officially opening its doors to students. The Morobe Provincial Government and the Papua New Guinea Government have funded the establishment of Lutheran University, and as a result of this official funding, a variety of subsequent initiatives have commenced.

Among these initiatives is the

completion of a Master Plan for the University which has also been accepted by the University's Establishment Committee. Based on the Master Plan, architectural designs and schematics for three buildings are being developed. Lutheran University has also installed and is maintaining satellite broadband internet service for the University's Project Office, Martin Luther Seminary, and Balob Teachers College.

Presently over 20 Balob Teachers College Lecturers are completing their Master of Education degrees. One Balob Teachers College/Martin Luther Seminary lecturer is also pursuing a Ph.D. in Old Testament Studies.

The former ELCPNG Communications building (Christian Radio Building) has been renovated and remodeled to

house Lutheran University's Project Office and the ELCPNG's Communications Department of the national church. It is hoped that in the future the ELCPNG will be able to introduce a Christian radio station for Papua New Guinea.

A variety of other important initiatives are under way including the development of

a university quality primary education curriculum, as well as the development of a bachelor of nursing degree program under the leadership of University of Queensland's School of Nursing and Midwifery in Australia.

Theological Education Ablaze!

Theological Education in Southeast Asia

"Training is springing up all over the place," says Rev. Carl Hanson, LCMS World Mission's Theological Education Facilitator for Asia. "Many emerging and established Lutheran communities are interested in confessional Lutheran teaching and solid Biblical training. They especially want to know what Lutherans have to say (and teach) about Law and Gospel." This fall has seen an explosion in the number of training events across Asia.

In Tarutung, Indonesia, Rev. Dr. Jonathan Blanke led a four-day session with pastors and deaconesses from the Huria Kristen Batak Protestant Lutheran Church which focused on church administration. This proved to be an exciting session as there were many questions about practical everyday ministry.

A five-day training seminar was held in Yangon, Myanmar with the Lutheran Church of Myanmar. Seventeen pastors, evangelists and deaconesses participated in this, the second seminar for their church body. The seminar included an in-depth biblical study of the book of Romans with an introduction to the Psalms. "Many of the students asked real questions that they were facing in their ministries which made our time together extremely practical," Hanson said. While in Yangon, Rev. Hanson was also able to visit with the leaders of the National Lutheran Church of Myanmar, and met with some of the families helped by LCMS World Relief and Human Care and Concordia Welfare and Education Foundation - Thailand in the aftermath of Cyclone Nargis which destroyed many homes on May 2, 2008.

India Probationers Making an Impact

In the India Evangelical Lutheran Church (IELC), probationers (vicars) are sent out after their seminary training, and the overwhelming majority plant new churches. In the past three years, 42 probationers have planted 62 mission stations where 135 of the members are new Christians brought into the family of Christ through baptism.

Special Needs Schools in India

The India Evangelical Lutheran Church (IELC) has established six special needs schools that are open to all children regardless of their religious background. All of the children in these schools will be celebrating Christmas with their classmates, as all six schools teach the children that God loves them so much that He sent His Son to save them.

These seeds of hope for a child with a handicap send a loving message to the families as well as the children themselves.

David and Beth Hoepfner are searching for additional resources to help the teachers in these schools share the Gospel message with their students. Rev. Dave Andrus from the Lutheran Blind Mission in St. Louis will be sending the IELC Blind School Braille magazines and 10 Catechisms, plus slates for making additional Braille papers. In 2011 Bethesda Lutheran Communities plan to help the two schools for mentally challenged children. The Hoepfners will be giving these two schools along with the three schools for the hearing impaired more posters, puppets and Christian music CD's on their return trip to India in January 2011. Much more is needed, especially materials for younger
